- **Description of Semester Course:** This is the equivalent of a college-level introductory course in political science which introduces students to fundamental concepts used by political scientists to study the processes and outcomes of politics in a variety of country settings. Six countries form the core of the AP Comparative government and Politics course: Great Britain, Russia, China, Mexico, Nigeria and Iran. Two of the CA standards to be addressed include: R1.1: Trace the etymology of significant terms used in political science and history; R 2.1: analyze public documents (e.g. policy statements, speeches, debates, platforms).
- **Directions:** Submit a monthly work packet of assignments listed on monthly cover sheet, which can be found on the teacher page at the MEA website. In order to receive attendance credit, and to receive full academic credit, the packet must be shown to the supervising teacher and submitted to the subject teacher on or before the monthly due date. Semester One Content:

Summer reading: Because this is a one semester AP course, summer reading is required in order to complete all requirements. Students are to read two chapters over the summer: Introduction to Comparative Politics, and Politics in the United States. There will be quizzes on this material in September.

Month 1: Intro to Comparative Politics, Politics in Great Britain; European Union

Month 2: Political Institutions; Sovereignty, Authority and Power; Politics in China; start Russia

Month 3: Citizens, Society and the State; Political and Economic Change; finish Russia; start Politics in Iran

Month 4: Globalization; Public Policy; Civil Society; finish Politics in Iran; begin Politics in Mexico

Month 5: Mexico cont.; Politics in Nigeria; International Institutions

Semester Two – although this is now a one semester course, there will be an opportunity to take full-length practice tests in April in preparation for the AP Exam in May.

Objectives and Methods of Study:

These expectations may be adapted to meet individual needs but you <u>must</u> clear it with the subject teacher in advance.

- 1. Take notes on, or outline readings from Kesselman, 6th edition. Access Kesselman practice tests and flash cards on http://elearning.sandi.net/course/view.php?id=453.
- 2. Complete Ken Wedding Teaching Tools (which will be attached to the cover sheets) that correspond to each topic assigned in the Kesselman text.
- 3. Define and describe five vocabulary terms per week based on readings and handouts. Give a real-life example from one of the six AP countries for each of the terms.

- 4. Paraphrase and analyze current event articles related to the six AP countries studied from *The Economist* and other selected journals and essays (at least one per month).
- 5. Each month, write a position paper focusing on one of the AP topics to be assigned each month, usually comparing two AP countries. Paper should be 5-6 pages, size 12 font, double-spaced, plus a Sources Cited page.
- 6. Complete monthly exam the by the Friday semester due date.
